Friday April 5 at 12:00 pm EDT.


Zach Bigalke will be presenting work from his dissertation in a session titled "How the United States is Represented in Women's Soccer Beyond the USWNT." Since the first FIFA Women's World Cup in 1991, 109 American-born women have played for the U.S. Women's National Team in the tournament. In that same time period, 110 American-born women played for other national teams at the World Cup. Zach discusses the phenomenon of the United States as a global exporter of women's soccer talent and the impact that has on both national narratives and the individuals who make these choices.

Graham Guides Available on the SASH Website



The Society is pleased to announce that <u>the complete Bill Graham</u> Guides Collection is now available for free download.

Edited and compiled by legendary Scottish-born US soccer journalist Bill Graham, the first edition was published in 1948. He released eight further editions under various titles through 1956. In 1960, the United States Soccer Football Association revived the guide with Graham as editor. After Graham's retirement, Clive Toye, Dave Hirshey, Francisco Marcus and John McKeon edited subsequent editions through the final 1973 edition. All told, 22 editions were published between 1948 and 1973, containing some 3,400 pages of historical records.

The Society extends its deep gratitude to the donors who made the Graham Guides Digitization Project possible. In making the Bill Graham Guides collection freely available, SASH hopes to spark scholarship in the period leading up to the soccer boom in the United States that began in the 1970s.


Podcasts Available on the SASH Website

In Memorium




Franz Beckenbauer

Franz Beckenbauer, one of the greatest defenders of the modern era, died on January 7, 2024. He was born on September 11, 1945 in Munich Germany. Beckenbauer had a storied career both on the field and on the coach's bench. He is one of only three people to win the World Cup as a player (1974) and manager (1990), and one of only nine players to have won the World Cup, European Champions Cup and Ballon d'Or.

Although he started his career at SC 1906 München, he is best known for his time at Bayern Munich. After a successful career with The

Bavarians, he signed with the New York Cosmos of the North American Soccer League (NASL) in 1977. During his time in the US, Beckenbauer won the Soccer Bowl three times (1977, 1978, 1980) and was named an NASL All-Star five times. He was inducted into the National Soccer Hall of Fame in 1998.

Ronald P. Maierhofer

Ronald Paul Maierhofer passed away on January 4th, 2024 in Myrtle Beach, South Carolina. Born in Buffalo, New York, in 1935, he attended the Park School where he graduated in 1953. A standout athlete, he earned All-League honors in multiple sports including soccer.

After high school, Maierhofer attended Canisius College in Buffalo, and played soccer semi-professionally in Canada until he was drafted in 1954. After leaving the army he enrolled at Cornell University,

where he left an indelible mark on the soccer field. He earned Second Team All-American honors in 1959, was a two-time All-Ivy first team pick, and was a Captain and MVP his senior year. He was inducted into the Cornell University Athletic Hall of Fame in 1986.

Maierhofer was a member of the U.S. Soccer Men's National Team at the 1959 Pan American Games, helping secure a Bronze medal finish and winning a spot on the 1960 U.S. Olympic team. Unfortunately, the squad did not qualify for the games that year. He continued to play soccer after college lining up for several clubs including Maccabee Los Angeles.

In 1980, Ron and his brother Howard, founded the Denver Avalanche, a franchise in the Major Indoor Soccer League. Under their ownership, the team competed for two seasons before being sold to an investor group in Tacoma, Washington. Ron writes about this experience in his book, *No Money Down: How to Buy a Sports Franchise – A Journey Through an American Dream*, and he further expands on his lifelong love for soccer in his books, *Memoirs of a Soccer Vagabond*, and *My Search for Me*.
